Who May Apply:	City, county, state, special district, or township governments; for-profit organizations other than small businesses; federally recognized Native American tribal governments; Native American tribal organizations; Nonprofits, other than institutions of higher education; private, public, and state-controlled institutions of higher education		
Why Apply:	Receive funding under Purpose Area 1 for forensic pathology fellowships (up to two per application) and under Purpose Area 2 for resources necessary for medical examiner/coroner (ME/C) offices to achieve and maintain accreditation.		
Maximum per Award:	<ul> <li>Purpose Area 1 (Fellowships): Up to \$150,000 for one fellowship position and up to \$300,000 for two fellowship positions</li> <li>Purpose Area 2 (Accreditation): Up to \$100,000 per award</li> </ul>		
BJA encourages the following entities to apply:	<ul> <li>Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding under this program. However, previously awarded agencies are still eligible to apply.</li> <li>Convening or governing bodies that can apply on behalf of one or more entities.</li> </ul>		
Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:	<ul> <li>Recruiting</li> <li>Salary/stipend for the fellow and related costs</li> <li>Loan repayments</li> <li>Recruitment travel</li> <li>Equipment and supplies</li> <li>Training</li> <li>Medical license reimbursement</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Personnel</li> <li>Travel costs (allowable if they are incurred while supporting ME/C office's accreditation)</li> <li>New and maintaining accreditation</li> <li>Microgrants for ME/C offices (accreditation fees)</li> <li>Certification fees</li> </ul>

How to apply and when:	Submit a two-step application.
	(1)Register in <u>Grants.gov</u> and follow the prompts to submit two forms by April 10, 2024.
	(2) Then complete the full application in <u>JustGrants.usdoj.gov</u> by April 15, 2024. The application's major elements are:
	(a) The <b>proposal abstract</b> that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
	(b) The <b>proposal narrative</b> that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
	(c) The <b>web-based budget</b> form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
